URBAN EMPLOYMENT SURVEY

The U.S. Department of Labor's Urban Employment Survey is a new data collection program begun this summer in an attempt to pinpoint the problems and to measure changes in the situation in urban slum areas. The survey includes family and other demographic matters, employment status, earnings, education and training, and migration experience. Detailed questioning will provide data on barriers to employment, problems associated with looking for work, participation in Manpower or related training programs, lifetime work experience, and attitudes toward the expectations about work. At the present time, data are being collected in the poverty areas of 6 large U.S. Cities.

ANNUAL AWARD

We would like to remind the statistical community of Washington about the Washington Statistical Society Award for achievement by young professionals granted annually in the amount of \$100. This award is given to the person in the Washington area* judged to have made the most significant contribution to statistical theory or practice. Since members and nonmembers are eligible, please alert those individuals who are under 35 that they are eligible for the award. The work which they submit must be individually identifiable and completed or published prior to their 35th birthday and within the preceding calendar year. Submissions may be either in manuscript or published form.

A professional panel chaired by Dr. John H. Smith, Professor of Statistics, American University will judge the papers and decide if an award is to be made. Honorable mention status may be granted to one or more submissions per year in addition to the Award. An individual cannot be named as winner in two successive years.

Among other considerations, entries will be judged on the basis of the importance, originality and excellence of the contribution. The quality of the writing, including economy of statement, will also be considered.
